Afterwards we moved to Denhall lane where we looked over the marsh and had lunch. A couple of Whooper Swans went down well with the coffee. Then on to the Harp pub not for a drink but to see some Ring-tailed Hen harriers. A Kestrel and a Merlin were also seen.

Finally to the baths car park at Parkgate where we had good views of the Great White Egret and numerous Little egrets plus more Hen Harriers and another Merlin.

### **Burton Mere Wetlands and the Dee Estuary, 18 March 2014**

Parkgate had one wind-blown Hen Harrier plus close up views of Fieldfare, Redwing and over a hundred Starling in the horse paddock.

The feeders at Thurstaston added Coal Tit, Greenfinch and Bullfinch but strong winds made bird watching difficult down on the beach.

From here we took the recently opened path to the old Inner Marsh Farm Hide. There was no sign of the Long-eared Owl reported to be roosting near the hide.

Finally, we visited Burton Point, a newly opened area across the railway line, with panoramic views over the Dee Estuary.

Our total bird count was 45.

### **Burton Mere Wetlands, 15 March 2016**

Other species around the Centre were a Water Rail and a Stoat. Elsewhere on the Reserve we had Little Egret, Great White Egret, Heron (eating frogs), Hen Harrier and Sparrow Hawk. On the way to Burton Point, we had Linnet, Redwing, & Fieldfare. Our last observation was an unexpected Red Kite which flew over the Reserve, bringing our total to 52 species.

### **RSPB Burton Mere Wetland, Sunday 11th December 2016**

Seven members attended the trip to BMW and Burton Marsh. Overcast but otherwise rain free day. A scan of the reserve provided excellent views of three Marsh Harriers and a couple of buzzards. A Merlin alighted on a distant post but was moved on by a Kestrel. A visit to the feeding station provided views of the now less common Greenfinch. At the back of the reserve in the distance both whooper and Bewick swans fed on the grassy areas.

A walk towards Marsh Covert hide produced some woodland birds which included Greater Spotted Woodpecker, nuthatch and the usual tit flock. Fleeting glimpses of Cetti's warbler were seen as they flew from reedbed to reedbed. Once inside the hide we were treated to our first view of a Hen Harrier (ringtail). Many Black Tailed Godwits were here along with a Ruff.

On to Denhall lane where we saw Little Egret then to Neston where we had lunch. Here we had good views of a Short eared owl hunting, another ring tailed Hen Harrier and Marsh Harrier. Also distant views of Peregrine and Merlin. A Kestrel alighted close by giving us yet another bird of prey. Great white egrets are a familiar sight here and we weren't disappointed.

Finally, onto Parkgate where we had a Male Hen Harrier and another Peregrine.

Not a bad day out with a total of 57 species seen.

### **Burton Mere Wetlands RSPB, 15th January 2019**

A record number (23) of members visited RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands on a mild, part sunny dry day for our first visit of 2019. Unfortunately, there was some clearance work on the meadows behind the main lagoon with bonfires sending smoke across our view. So we decamped upwind to the Marsh Covert Hide where a Water Rail was spotted and lots of Wigeon. On the way we looked hopefully through the screens for Bearded Tits (spotted yesterday in the logbook) but no luck. The reedbed has grown substantially since our last visit giving great cover for the birds meaning we heard Cetti's Warbler but couldn't see it! I had to depart at this point for cardiac rehab so handed over the reins to Derek Todd and Ian Bunker. There were sightings of Snipe, Stonechat and Linnet.

The group split into two and some members went on to Parkgate spotting a Short-eared Owl really close chasing a Marsh Harrier!

Ian recorded a magnificent total of 47 species.

### **Burton Mere Wetlands, 15th December 2019**

Ten MCOS members met at RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands.

Large numbers of wild fowl were present including Canada, Greylag and Pink-footed Geese, Pintail, Shoveler, Gadwall, Shelduck, Wigeon, Tufted, Mallard and Teal Ducks. Waders included Black-tailed Godwit, Redshank, Oyster Catcher and Curlew. Herons; Great White Egret, Little Egret and Grey. Raptors; Marsh Harrier, Sparrow Hawk, Kestrel, Common Buzzard, Other birds of note were Siskin, Great-spotted Woodpecker, Redwing, Raven and Nuthatch.

After lunch the group moved on to Denhall Quay. Large numbers of wildfowl were seen in flight with Great and Little Egret also present. A male Hen Harrier gave some superb views as it hunted on the marsh in front of the group. Gulls included: Great Black-backed, Herring, Common and Black-headed.

With rain moving in the group then moved on to Parkgate.

With the weather improving a Short-eared Owl showed well and gave a super photo opportunity as it sat on a log at fairly close distance. Another male Hen Harrier, Merlin and Peregrine Falcon were also seen. With the light fading the group called it a day. Fifty-five species were seen. The bird of the day was a Male Hen Harrier.

### **Burton Mere Wetlands and Parkgate, 17th January 2020**

Twenty two members turned out for a cloudy but dry day at the RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands reserve. This is always a good reserve with a comfortable and warm visitor centre where those who don't want to walk round the reserve can stay and still get good birds. We immediately got a Great White Egret paddling close by with a Little Egret adjacent to see the differences. Lots of usual waterfowl and a Marsh Harrier hunting on the marsh. Other members got a Hen Harrier. On the way to the first hide we were lucky to get a fleeting glimpse of a Water Rail before it vanished into the reeds. After our sandwiches, half the party drove to Parkgate baths for views over the Dee estuary. Ian Bunker found a Merlin at distance. Later we saw a Hen Harrier being attacked by a Merlin which drove it off, brave bird! Lots of Pink-footed Geese resting on the grass. We walked further on

towards the golf course, before turning back and getting some close Redwing on the deck. Paul and Joe stayed on and bagged four Short-eared Owls with close views making them birders of the day! Total species count was 44.

### **Burton\_Mere and Parkgate, 12 December 2021**

Eight members met up at BMW RSPB with the sun starting to come out. Discussion centred around the drive through Puddington and a certain field containing 50 Little Egret, 5 Great Egrets and a single Cattle Egret. Plenty of Ravens, Jackdaws, Redwings and a couple of Mistle Thrushes on the nearby fields. We set off and headed towards the feeders. Three Great Spotted Woodpeckers were active on or near the feeders with an unexpected Corn Bunting on the overhead wires. Being such a sunny morning, it was singing part of its song which clinched identification. We examined the pools opposite the main hide where we saw our first Marsh Harrier. Plenty of the usual ducks and waders. Onwards to Denhall Lane where we had lunch. More Marsh Harriers, Merlin, Peregrine and a glance to Denhall Quay provided a good view of a Short-eared Owl. Next, to Burton Cliffs where a Little Owl was located.

Over to Parkgate for the final 2 hours where a Barn Owl was seen and an amazing grey male Hen Harrier came in to roost. Seven species of raptor and three species of owls seen. A total of 73 species seen.
